Christian Perspective—Trials



I recently had trouble with a wisdom tooth that had an abscess under it. First I had to fight infection, then take antibiotics, then have the tooth extracted, before recovery could begin. In the light of what many people experience it was a small problem, though

it felt bad enough at the time! None of us enjoys going through problems and difficulties. And sometimes people ask, 'if God is a good and loving God, why do so many bad things happen?' I often don't have an answer. But there are some insights in the Bible that help us get some understanding into this.

The apostle Paul went through many trials and times of persecution as he served God. When writing to the church in Corinth he starts in verse 6 of 2 Corinthians 4, by saying that God who created the light, made his light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of God's glory displayed in the face of Christ. How wonderful to experience God's presence in such a way. However he goes on to point out in verse 7: But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this allsurpassing power is from God and not from us.

We are still human beings living in a fallen world with an enemy of our souls who is always out to kill, steal and destroy. But God is on our case. He knows what we are made of; he knows our limitations, but also he knows how to take us through trails that will prove and grow our faith.

Life is tough as a Christian, but God has purpose in it all. Jesus has promised never to leave or forsake the ones who trust in him. So when things look bad and life feels tough, when we feel, as Paul did, hard-pressed, perplexed, struck down, persecuted even, along with this comes: not crushed, not in despair, not abandoned, not destroyed. See verses 8, 9. He could see that though the troubles came, God never left him without comfort.

Peter explains that even though we can rejoice in the salvation we have in Christ, there will still be trials which will also cause us grief. The trials come to prove the genuineness of our faith, and the final outcome will be *praise*, *glory and honour when Jesus Christ is revealed.* 1 Peter 1:6, 7.

Faith that is never tested is no faith at all, but when we continue to trust God through the

struggles and difficulties that come to us, our faith will grow and be proved genuine. Never give up on trusting in the Lord Jesus Christ; faith will grow and the outcomes will be glorious. God is with us.

Puzzle for July

Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust North Notts Local Group: Summer Programme



Despite a very damp start there are still lots of summer wildlife related activities to be enjoyed in north Nottinghamshire. The Idle Valley Watch Group meets regularly on the second Saturday of the month at the Idle Valley centre. It's for kids between 7 and 13, costs £2 each and lasts from 10.30am to 12.30pm. The July meeting is on the 13th. There will be a walk on the reserve while participants hunt for "Natural Jewels," or dragon flies! For adults (members only) there is the possibility of a guided walk in a beautiful, private woodland that is managed entirely for wildlife. The owner will tell us about his aims for the wood and explain the techniques he uses to achieve them. There will be an opportunity to do some pond dipping and, finally, if the weather's good, we'll finish with a picnic and the chance to chat or ask any further questions about the wood and its inhabitants.

Gary Hobson, of the Local Group will be

leading one of his exciting nature walks on the Idle Valley reserve. The next one will be on Wednesday 31st July, 9.00am-midday. Meet at Chainbridge Lane. General birdwatching from Chainbridge Scrape East and West viewing screens.

Please wear suitable clothing and footwear for the weather on the day plus food and water as required. Toilets and cafe facilities are available during usual opening times.

The Wednesday (Memory) Group Conspiracy Theories!

A few years ago, Anita, one of our members began to tell me that her family were keeping her away from her lifetime friends and were planning to 'get rid of her'.

From what I knew of her family, that seemed very unlikely but she was clearly distressed and regularly told me variations of this story. Chatting to her son one day, when he came to collect her, I told him about her concerns. "I don't know where she gets the idea we're trying to get rid of her from," he said, "but it's true her friends stay away. I just think they don't know what to say to her. She comes out with such silly things."

We talked about her inability to understand what people were saying to her; how frightening and confusing that must be and how, in those circumstances, it would be easy to think information was being deliberately kept from you. Some kind of plot was being hatched, Anita was convinced. What could it be but her worst nightmare: "They are planning to get rid of me?" Seen from the person with dementia's point of view, strange behaviour is often easier to understand and the better we understand it, the easier it is to accept and sympathise.

If you care for someone with dementia or you yourself have a diagnosis or if you want to know more and you think the Wednesday Group might be helpful, do get in touch.

RECIPES to try ...

SUGARED CURRANT CAKES - makes 12

As made in 18th century when Afternoon Teas became suddenly popular. Blame London's Vauxhall Tea Gardens!

 Sieve together:
 9oz SR Flour
 ¼ teasp mixed spice
 pinch each salt and cinnamon

 Stir in:
 2oz currants
 2oz ground almonds
 7oz golden granulated sugar

 1 egg, beaten
 4oz melted butter
 4oz melted butter

Mix to a soft dough then roll out on baking paper to 10 x 12 inches Brush surface <u>very</u> lightly with water Sprinkle with little extra sugar tossed with pinch of cinnamon Using the paper, roll up as for a swiss roll then cut into $\frac{3}{4}$ " slices Place on a baking sheet, well apart



Bake at 200°C 400°F Mark 6 gas for 10-15mins till lightly browned

CARROT GINGER CAKE

 Cream together:
 4oz butter
 3oz light muscovado sugar *

 Fold in:
 2 beaten eggs
 4oz SR flour
 1 teasp baking powder

 Add:
 4oz grated carrot
 2oz ground almonds
 3 pieces stem ginger, sliced thinly

 2 tablsp of its syrup
 2 carrot de la carrot
 200% 250% Medi 4 page for 55%

Spoon into 1lb loaf tin and bake at 180°C 350°F Mark 4 gas for 55mins

Make icing using more syrup - freezes well

* I use mix of granulated and ordinary muscovado or all golden granulated





- 1. Minutes of the Last Meeting The minutes for May 2023 were accepted Proposed by Michaela Blount, seconded by Nadine Croft.
- Election of Chairperson The Chair Stephen Cordery signified his willingness to continue as Chair. That was proposed by Lindsey Buxton, seconded by Ceri Smith and agreed by all. Stephen Cordery then took the Chair for the rest of the meeting.
- 3. Election of Vice Chairperson The Vice Chair Elaine Gargett in absence had agreed to remain as Vice Chair as well. That was proposed by Lindsey Buxton, seconded by Ceri Smith and agreed by all.
- 4. Chairperson's Allowance All members agreed that the allowance rate remain as has been for a number of years at zero. It was also agreed that the current bank mandate signatories therefore remained the same.
- 5. Chairpersons' Report The previous year Chair, Stephen Cordery, presented his report which had been previously circulated. That was accepted and of note were: The loss of councillor Nadine Croft due to work pressures: The Whinze / Gibbet Hill Common project: The Mayflower Memorial: Stephen Cordery closed with his thanks to all councillors, parishioners and officers for their interest and hard work in the last year. Stephen was thanked for his report.
- 6. Treasurer's Report Was presented by Tony Smith after previously being circulated and accepted by all. The Annual Accounts were also presented, accepted and agreed to be signed off as required by the Annual Governance and Accountability procedures. It was noted that our total Expenditure and Income was still above the £25,000 external audit threshold and so we would again be externally audited this year. 03/0524: CHAIR'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2024

It has been a slightly quieter year for the Parish Council since our last annual meeting but with a number of ongoing events and projects continuing.

There was another excellent village festival with extremely busy days in both Ranskill and Torworth parks, with the addition of classic cars and bike displays being particularly welcome to some of us! Whilst it is a shame that there will not be an event this year, the new members of the organising committee are already planning for 2025. My thanks to all the volunteers and particularly Councillors Peel and Pryce for their contributions.

An expanded and extremely cold event was held for the switch on of the Christmas tree lights in December, including a poetry competition for the pupils of Ranskill Primary School that I was very pleased to judge. I'm sure everyone enjoyed the live recitals on the night. Again my thanks to Councillor Pryce for organising this.

Work to update the equipment in the play park continues and an application for grant funding was submitted, unfortunately unsuccessfully on this occasion despite the hard work by Councillor Bing. An updated application is now ready to be submitted for the latest round of funding very shortly. Once the outcome is known then a design can be finalised with further input from the pupils of Ranskill Primary School and residents in general.

There have been a couple of contentious planning application that, whilst not directly in the village, will have an impact on the community, particularly with potential traffic volumes. The Parish Council has strenuously objected to these and will continue to do so throughout the planning process.

We now have sufficient volunteers to re-commence the Speedwatch initiative and the group will hopefully begin to deploy shortly, under Councillor Shaw's guidance.

I am pleased to be able to say that the Parish Council finds itself in probably its best financial position in recent times, once the park refurbishment is finalised, we will need to decide how to allocate the funds, particularly the time limited CIL monies, in consultation with the village. It may even involve revisiting a long standing and dreaded question!

Unfortunately, we have, so far, been unsuccessfully in securing more significant resurfacing works in the village, particularly Blyth Road. This is something that the Parish Council will continue to lobby for at every opportunity with the county council.

My thanks once again to all my fellow councillors for their hard work over the past year and I hope that we will welcome some new members shortly. Thanks also to our County and District Councillors for their help this year.

04/0524: FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2024

The year to March 2024 saw the Parish Council increasing its total reserves by £64,467 to £117,210.

A breakdown of Parish Council reserves shows that it is made up of: -Restricted CIL: £69,417 Ringfenced Defibrillator reserve: £137 General reserve: £47,656

In addition, the PC's share of the Joint Burial funds amounts to £5,024 (at 70% of cash funds).

Regarding the budget for 2023-24, expenditure was overall below target by £165 and income was £1,147 above the budget. Major expenditure during the year:-Grants £660 The Star £200 Allotments £150 First Responders £581 Ranskill Festival Capital £981 Legal charges for land registration £117 PA system for Christmas Lights dedication £781 Via EM school crossing patrol

We also spent £5,025 of CIL funds, on various maintenance tasks in the playground, repairing the noticeboards and a new electrical enclosure for the Christmas lighting.

CIL funding of £66,986 was received during the year, closing at £69,417. It is intended to replace older playground equipment in the near future. Pending further grant applications these funds are placed on attractive terms on bank deposit.

Due to pressure from heavily increasing costs, the precept was increased by 8% for the 2024-25 financial year.

Station Rd drainage: Resident has direct contact name/details for NCC/Via engineers following site meeting last week. report to me read:

"Our Drainage Maintenance Team were there to pinpoint the location of the damaged gully connection that is causing the issue. There is a possibility that we can excavate to expose and hopefully repair the damage before the

end of this month. That will be dependent on whether we have sufficient width to avoid the need for temporary traffic signals on the road. Due to the proximity of the level crossing, if we do need signals, then we'll need to consult with Network Rail. There is a minimum 15 working day lead in to even engage in discussion with Network Rail, so in that instance we'd be looking at late June for the works. I've given the resident my direct contact information."

Blyth Rd petition re road surface: suggest aiming for me to present to Full Council Thursday 18 July, otherwise we're stuck until 26 Sept.
