## **Christian Perspective**



Most of us have to deal with many different struggles and problems in our lives and in the lives of those we love. It's easy for others to say,"Don't worry; I'm sure everything will be all right", but it doesn't help much especially if we have no grounds to say such a thing. It doesn't really matter what our problems are, if we have faith in Jesus Christ there is always somewhere to go with our troubles. The apostle Peter writes in his first letter: Cast all your

*anxiety on him because he cares for you.* 1 Peter 5:7. That sounds good, and it's comforting to know God cares about us. But how do we actually go about doing it, in the middle of our trouble?

Paul helps us to approach this when he writes in his letter to the Philippians: *Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. Phil 4:6.* So we are to turn to prayer, starting with thanksgiving. There are always things to thank God for even when life has its troubles. And when we start with thanksgiving it already changes our heart attitude. Then we can move on to prayer and petition.

We also always need to pray in faith. Jesus said to his disciples: *Truly I tell you, if you have faith as* small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move. Mat 17:20. We don't need a massive amount of faith. A little faith in a great big, loving God is enough to see things happen. He is the one with the power and when we trust in him and come in faith with our requests, we can be sure he hears us and answers.

Paul continues in Philippians 4:7, that when we come to God like this, we can be sure he will give us his peace. This peace, he writes, *which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.* So that even though our problems might not immediately go away, we can rest in his peace in the middle of it all and see what he will do for us and for those we pray for. And we can trust those we love to our Heavenly Father's hands and receive his peace, believing he will do the best for them.

Paul has one last helpful thought in his letter. He encourages the believers to think about and focus on the things that are true and noble, right, pure and lovely, things that are admirable, excellent and praiseworthy. What a great list! And



with this we can expect God's peace to sustain us.

So as you face the troubles and difficulties that come in your lives, look to God with faith, come with thanksgiving, bring your requests and receive his peace in your hearts. God bless you.

## **Puzzle for November**



## Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust The Coherent Motion of Starling Murmurations



Who hasn't stood looking in wonder at a starling murmuration at least once in their life? A swirling, whirling mass of birds making incredible, shapes against the sky that separate and reform in beautiful fluid movements. Then, suddenly, they are gone, dropping as though at a signal, into the reeds. Who told them when to do that? How come they never bump into one another? What makes them gather in the first place?

Enter Kathryn Cooper, photographer, artist, scientist and our November speaker. Kathryn's award-winning photography will help reveal some of the secrets of the starlings' movements. She has won numerous awards for her work, the most recent was being shortlisted for the Sony World Photography Awards Professional Series. Kathryn spent her early career developing techniques for medical imaging that she now uses in her nature photography. She takes many successive exposures and then overlays them onto the same print, a technique that reveals motion and behaviour that would otherwise remain hidden. Kathryn's images have revealed much

about collaborative behaviour and complex systems that is relevant to all our lives. This really is one talk not to be missed. Come and experience some cutting edge science, learn a little more about our local wildlife and appreciate some great art!

Gradually the tension vanishes, they're looking relaxed, smiling, starting a conversation.

One day I heard something that took my breath away for a moment: "It's made all the difference to my life, coming here," said one lady. We volunteers change too. As we become more confident and get to know people better volunteers are more likely to adopt new approaches or to try new activities. The result is that the group is changing and developing all the time to reflect the interests and abilities of its members. It's a very different group from the one we started ten years ago. We didn't have live music then and we never thought of getting up and dancing. Ten years on, and it's much more exciting!

## RECIPES to try ...

## CHEESE AND MUSTARD PUDDING - Serves 4

To serve with crisp-fried bacon

 6oz grated cheese
 1½ pints "semi" milk
 2 teasp mustard (Dijon or English)

 1oz butter
 3 eggs
 5-6 thick slices white bread

 Salt & pepper
 5.6 thick slices white bread

 Mix most of the cheese with mustard and 3 tblsp of the milk – season to taste

 Lightly butter the bread (with crusts)

 Spread each slice with the cheese/mustard mix and cut each into triangles

 Arrange in buttered dish, points upward

 Beat together eggs and rest of the milk and pour over then sprinkle remaining cheese on top

 Bake at 180°C 360°F Mark 4 gas for 35 mins

 Serve with the bacon and a sprinkle of Worcester sauce

## **MUSTARD BAKED CHICKEN** - Serves 4

4 chicken fillets or 8 boned thighs In a small bowl mix – level measure 4 tablsp melted butter 2 tablsp lemon juice 4 tablsp Dijon mustard 1 tablsp brown sugar 1 teasp paprika Place chicken in buttered dish, brush with some of the mustard mix Bake at 200°C 400°F Mark 6 gas for 15 mins Turn chicken pieces and brush with remaining mix Sprinkle on 3 tablsp poppy seeds and bake for a further 15 mins

Serve with pasta shells and pan juices poured over



# Ranskill Ramblings—Part 2

## Station Road

Where the Top Shop is now was Fullers shop, Post Office and Bakery. Bob Fuller baked bread and cakes in what is now the Fish & Chip shop and they were delivered round the district by van. He made a lot of money and bought several properties in the village.

Plumtree Cottage next to the Chapel was said to be a school many years ago.

The first house on Gladstone Terrace was a shop run by Mrs Hurst. Mr Hurst had lost a leg above the knee and got around on a pair of large wooden crutches. In spite of this they took in three evacuees from the Great Yarmouth area who I often used to play with. Sadly, only two of them went back as one was knocked down by a car on the crossroads and killed.

At Blyton House lived Mr & Mrs Johnson of Skinner & Johnson. They had a lot to do with the Chapel. Mr Johnson ran a silver SS Jaguar, a very nice car.

At Bourne Villas lived Mrs Hindmarsh who spent half her life on Station Road gossiping and was well known for it.



Just before the crossing on the right was the Skinner & Johnson forkworks, which at that time was the biggest employer in the village. They made forks and spades and all types of garden tools which were stronger and lighter than anything you can buy today, some are still in use in my garden. They also ran a lorry to Harworth and Bircotes every day to bring in more workers. According to my mother, one of the Skinners was a bit of a lad and did a runner with some of the firm's money. Ken Johnson lived on Folly Nook and rode a horse called Rufus which had never been known to break into a trot.

Next came the Station, the Stationmasters house and the station yard. Jess Potter ran a coal business from the yard.

In Autumn, Station Road would

be littered with sugar beet and turnips as farmers sent their produce away by rail. If a certain signalman was on duty we would go into the signal box and watch him at work, it was great.

Where Lowfields is now was the hostel which housed workers from the ROF factory, which ran from the bottom of Ranskill nearly to Sutton and employed 4,000 people. The hostel stretched from Station Road to the top of the school field and at the Lowfield end was the dining hall and the concert hall. At that time the path by the railway was a proper road.

After the factory closed the hostel was turned into a teacher training college. Some of the local females thought all their Christmases had come at once – 600 young men on the doorstep! When the college closed the site was built on, apart from the two large halls which were left for light industry.

James Maude were pattern makers and Saville Brindley precision engineers were two that I remember.

Over the crossing was the malt kiln owned at one time by Barnsley Brewery Co. Mr Beeston was the manager and one day during Scout Bob a Job Week (a bob was one shilling or 5p today) my friend and I asked if he had any jobs we could do. Yes he said, we could whitewash the inside of his two hen houses. This we did and came home covered in fleas and lice.

Straight on down Common Lane and before the stream was the large area of land that had been quarried for sand and gravel and just left. Nature had reclaimed it so there was lush grass and wild flowers everywhere, fish in the ponds and an abundance of wildlife.

Also on that side of the line was the branch line to the ROF factory. When the factory closed the line was kept on as a wagon repair siding. There was also a precast concrete works.

## Mattersey Road

Until the mid 1930's the village sports field stretched down Mattersey Road as far as Ranskill House and down Station Road as far as the Bowling Green. It belonged to the Worksop & Retford Brewery Co.

In the corner near the Chapel my mother had a wooden shop and a little further down Mattersey Road was the Pavilion.

The only house on the other

side of the road was Laburnum Cottage where pig farmer George Richardson lived. He also farmed the fields where Southfall and Stonehill Close stand. On the Stonehill side was a long wooden building which during the war housed an auxiliary fire engine.

At the Red House (now Belmont Manor) lived the Durnfords, one of whom used to take a boat on the Ballast Hole (now Birchwood) and paint landscapes. My mother said they also planted the trees on Mattersey Road.

The Ballast Hole was created when the railway company needed material to build the viaduct at Bawtry.

## **Blyth Road**

Just around the corner, Mrs Jervis sold fruit and vegetables from a house which is now part of the Blue Bell Inn.



The founder of W H Otley Ltd lived at The Grange. He was quite well known in the area, was a member of the Blyth and Ranskill Parish Councils, helped to form Ranskill Scout Troop and ran a bible class for many years. The business at that time was in Doncaster but eventually had to move due to redevelopment and came to Ranskill.

Next to the corn business was a cottage, long since demolished, where Alf Cook lived. Alf had worked on the land all his life and fancied himself as a weather forecaster. I will say no more!

The first farmer I can remember at Larkfield Farm was Mr Rhodes. After him came Mr Cowling a 'gentleman farmer'.

He joined the Parish Council

and was very keen to get the council houses built on Station Road. Some other residents were not so keen. He also had the first diesel tractor in the village.

Colonel and Mrs Brown lived at Thorn House and had jewellers shops in Sheffield, Doncaster and Scarborough. Every year they had a garden fete in aid of church funds. They also had a Rolls Royce.

Joe Dyson was the gardener at Thorn House and when he retired he bought a caravan and lived in it in the field next to Blue Bell Court. Joe was handy with a pair of scissors and used to cut my hair and that of several other people. His wife Minnie was a member of the WI. One year they put on a show in the Church Room. I can't remember what it was called but it was very funny and Minnie was the star of the show.

Mr Kitchin farmed at Poplar Farm. He always wore his flat cap back to front to keep the rain from running down his neck.

The Gillot family lived at Birk Hill (now Ranskill Mount) and had a steel business in Sheffield. I seem to remember the garden had its own irrigation system supplied from a well and pumped by a wind turbine.

In 1891 they built the Reading Room and library on the Great North Road. In the early part of the 20th century, two full billiard tables were acquired and the library part faded away. It is still functioning and has a team in the Retford Snooker League.
